

Dr. Edmund E. Day Inducted As Fifth Head of Cornell

Fifty-Three School Heads View Impressive Ceremonies On October 8

Dr. Edmund Ezra Day was inducted into office as Cornell's fifth president at an impressive ceremony Friday, October 8. Administrative heads of fifty-three universities and colleges were among the many guests in town for the occasion.

Dr. Day came to Cornell with an impressive record as an economist and as an administrator of the Rockefeller funds for the study of social securing and economic insecurity, international relations, public administration, and the improvement of secondary edu-

Aided World-Wide Studies

Under his direction since 1028, the division of social sciences of the Rockefeller Foundation has aided worldwide studies and training during a period of great social unrest and change. Included were the completion of the Encyclopedia of the Social Studies, work on costs of medical care, studies of unemployment relief, and contributions to the work of the Brookings Institution, National Bureau of Economic Research, and the public administration centers at Harvard and Syracuse.

From 1933 until the time of his appointment, he had charge of the ten million dollar program of the General Education board for the improvement of secondary school education in the United States. One of these projects was the inquiry in the character and cost of publication in New York under the regents.

Dartmouth Graduate

Dr. Day received his BS from Dartmouth in 1905, and his MA. the following year. He then served as instructor in economics there until 1910, with the exception of 1908-09 when he received his Ph. D. at Harvard. For the next thirteen years he was a member of the economics department

In 1023, Dr. Day went to the University of Michigan, where he organized the School of Business Administration and served as its first dean. In 1927, he went to the Laura Spelman Rockefeller Memorial for a year, | Calif.

He is a former president of the American Statistical Association, a member of the American Economics Association, and the Royal Economic Society of Great Britain. He is the author of Statistical Analysis, written in 1925, and a co-author of The Growth of Manufactures, written in

In his inaugural address, Dr. Day disclosed no radical changes of policy for the University, emphasizing rather that the broad liberal policy of the institution would be vigorously pro-

Those who preceded Dr. Day in this important office are Dr. Andrew D. White, who served from 1866 to 1885; Dr. Charles K. Adams, who held office until 1892; Dr. Jacob G. Schurman, who served until his resignation in 1920; and Dr. Livingston Farrand, who retired last June.

Chapter Records Alumni Deaths in Summer Months

Reed '37 Dies at Dayton, O., From Infantile Paralysis Soon After Graduation

Three members of the chapter have died, the chapter has recently learned. It is with genuine sorrow that these deaths are recorded.

The one to touch the chapter most intimately was the untimely death of Alexander G. Reed '37 who died August 31 at his home, 305 Oakwood Road, Dayton, O. Infantile paralysis was the cause of his death. He had been at summer school to finish up the necessary work for his degree in architecture and died soon after his return home.

Hess '87 Dies

Col. F. Judson Hess '87 died in Rochester, N. Y., September 24, 1936, the chapter only recently learned. He had lived there all his life, heading the Hess Perfume and Costuming Co.

He was on the Hill for a year as an architecture student, and was class navy director and rowed on his class crew. In addition, he was a member of the Glee and Banjo Clubs.

Served in War

After leaving the University, he became active in the National Guard and served in both the Spanish-American war and the World War. When the University's war memorial was constructed, he endowed a room to honor the members of the class of '87 who served in those two wars.

The chapter has also learned that Major John N. Wright '92, who had been listed on the chapter roll as lost for some time, died June 17, 1934. It is believed that his death occurred in California.

A previously unannounced honor was the election of Hal Sawyer as manager of the ski team this year.


These activities, coupled with the promise shown by the pledge class. will mean that the closing of another year next June will still find Alpha Delta Phi well up in Hill standing.

Room Rent, Dues Reduced to Parity Of Other Good Houses On the Hill

Leonard Colt '22, Charles C. Carter '22, and Paul K. Rice '25 were named as new members of the Board of Trustees of the Alpha Delta Phi Corporation at the annual meeting of that organization last June. Walter C. Teagle 'oo, Paul H. Deming '94, and Roger W. Hooker '20 were reelected to the Board.

Main business of the meeting was the question of charges for room rent and fraternity dues. As a result, a fair reduction in charges was made, and now Alpha Delts pay charges comparable to other fraternities on the Hill having similar equipment.

It was pointed out to the undergraduates present that the function of the graduate chapter is to bear the burden of paying interest, taxes, insurance, and upkeep on the property. The undergraduates are responsible for keeping the rooms fully occupied and for running the chapter affairs in a business-like manner.

Plans are being made to start a campaign within a short time whose purpose will be to receive subscriptions from the alumni which will be used to reduce the mortgage indebtedness and create a fund for the future upkeep of the property.
