Bascom Little '01 Dies; Gave the Tomb to Chapter

At press time we learn of the death of (Tully) Bascom Little '01 which took place May 27, 1940, in Cleveland, Ohio. He is best known to Cornell Alpha Delts because of the fact that he gave the Tomb to the chapter in memory of his brother, Hiram M. Little '00, who died in 1900.

As president of the firm of Crowell & Little, he constructed the present chapter house.

During the World War he was chairman of the national defense committee of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce. He was also a colonel in Ordnance, and was appointed by Secretary Newton D. Baker to an Army board to select the best machine gun; he received the Distinguished Service Medal.

Spring Panel of Jurors Gives Gavel to Schurman

Jacob Gould Schurman, Jr. 17, judge of General Sessions in New York City, has never used a gavel while on the bench, either as Chief City Magistrate or in his present capacity.

Winsor French Woodward '03 died October 6, 1939. He was 59, lived at 7953 Montgomery Avenue, Elkins Park, Pa.

He had been with W. R. Grace & Co., New York City; S. H. Burbank & Co., printers, and Shelly Salesbook Co., Philadelphia; American Salesbook Co., Elmira; Pioneer Electric Safety Minelamp Co., General Coal Co., Philadelphia; and from 1933 until his death he was commercial representative of Standard Oil Co. of Pennsylvania.

During the war he served in the Navy, came to Cornell from Brooklyn Polytechnic institute and was enrolled four years in mechanical engineering and Arts & Sciences. He was a member of Quill & Dagger, Mummy Club, Savage Club, Masque, Bench and Board, Mermaid, Widow board, and manager of Era. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Elizabeth Flannery Woodward.


