Naval Training Station Continues to Create Campus War Atmosphere

Using All of Baker Dorms; Mess Hall Now Feeding Most of Complement

The complement at the N a v a l Training Station at Cornell dropped off to about 650 men during the last few months, but on November 1 approximately 800 apprentice seamen arrived for a month of indoctrination, following which they will be commissioned ensigns.

Some students were admitted to the men's dorms this fall, but they have been vacated to make room for the new men. Fraternities have been asked to take in as many of their freshmen as they can.

The communications school of the Training School has been moved to Harvard, which accounted for the drop in personnel from 1000 to 650. The Diesel engineering school is being enlarged, however, and a new Diesel lab has just been completed on Sage Green near the Old Armory.

The mess hall for navy men has been in use since September 10. Located behind the men's dorms, near the Psi U house, it is the scene of bigscale eating. Statistics were released recently on the quantity of food the men consume, and it puts our ordinary wolf-like appetites to shame. These men are fed a hearty breakfast and then they get two full dinners, not the usual luncheon and dinner idea. They bring the meat in town by the truck load, which begins to give an idea why there is a shortage. These men put in a rigorous day. however, and are entitled to all they get. And that goes for all the rest of you men in uniform. We'll fill up on other stuff until we get in, and then we'll be expecting the same good fare.

Additional desks and chairs were also purchased to provide studying facilities for the new freshmen, and these have been placed in some of the larger rooms on the second floor. This new arrangement brings the total number of men living in the house to 32.

Changes in Student Life Include Smaller Parties, No Autos and No Cuts

Physical Training Program Made Compulsory For All Men Students

As you have probably anticipated, there are many changes in campus life this year, brought about by the demands of war, but such changes are only natural and have very largely been received as such by the student body.

In addition to an accelerated program of studies, the University has banned student cars for the duration. Several hundred special permits were granted where a necessity was shown, but by and large the familiar campus and fraternity parking areas are comparatively empty. Local gas stations can verify that Ithaca traffic is down.

Next innovation was a program of compulsory physical training for all men students—three hours per week for upperclassmen, two hours for underclassmen — except for those on a varsity squad. One of those hours has been devoted to the new Commando course until the Ithaca winter set in.


A no-cut system has been adopted by the University at the request of the War Department, as a result classes are more regularly populated than usual, particularly near the end of the week. Houseparties have been made practically impossible by a ruling forbidding any party lasting more than one day. Of course there are ways of getting around it, but big weekends such as Junior Week and Spring Day are going by the board.

Enrollment is off somewhere between seven and ten percent over last year—the freshman class, with a record registration, holding the mark up to somewhat near normal. However, with questionnaires being mailed to the 18 and 19-year-olds, we can expect a sharp drop next term.
