Bequest of \$5000 Comes To Chapter Thru Will Of the Late A. S. Olmsted

Income from Fund Will Be Used for General Repairs, Improvements

Following the death of Allen Seymour Olmsted '79 on November 21, 1942, in Buffalo, N. Y., the chapter was advised that a bequest of \$5,000 to the chapter was contained in the will.

The late Brother Olmsted studied Science & Letters two years at Cornell. He later became the originator of Allen's Foot-Ease which he manufactured for 50 years.

One of the last acts of the benefactor was to present to the village of LeRoy, N. Y., the original mansion of Jacob LeRoy for whom the town was named. The mansion will be used by the LeRoy Historical Society for a museum.

He also left \$50,000 to Cornell University in the form of a trust fund for scholarships; \$5,000 to Williston Academy in Easthampton, Mass.; another \$50,000 to the First Presbyterian Church of LeRoy for a parish house. The Olmsted homestead and 10 acres of land were left to the village of LeRoy for use as a public park after the death of his brother and sister-in-law.

The Alpha Delta Phi Corporation officers have announced that the \$5,000 bequested to the chapter, will be invested in bonds, income from which is to be used for general improvements and repairs to the house and grounds.

Micou '16 Receives Citation On Leaving for New Command

When Lieut. Comdr. Benjamin H. Micou '16, USNR, left the Navy Pre-Flight School at Chapel Hill, N. C., last November for a new assignment as supply officer of Air Technical Training Command, Chicago, he was given the following citation by his office staff at Chapel Hill:

"The Supply Department . . . by serving under your direction has been taught the grandeur of extreme devotion to service. From your purposeful driving spirit we have learned true zeal. From your comprehensive planning, your painstaking attention to detail, we have learned infinite patience. Your unselfish, unsparing demands upon yourself have taught us the fuller meaning of duty. Your courtly consideration of others has become our model for loyalty and cooperation. Though you leave us, much of you will remain. These things you have taught us we shall not forget, any more than we can forget you."

In addition, he was presented a hand-painted plaque bearing a water-color portrait of himself, sketches of the Navy wings, an aircraft carrier, a plane, the Supply Corps emblem, and the signatures of his fellow workers.

Exodus of Students for the Armed Forces Compared to Spring of 1917; Fraternities Losing Men; Cornell to Train Men for Navy

During this month of February we are probably re-enacting rather closely what took place at Cornell during the months of April and May, 1917, although on possibly a slightly smaller scale.

The entrance of college students into the armed forces is being stepped up markedly since the end of the last term, and bidding adieu to fraternity brothers and other Cornell friends is becoming a daily occasion. Not only are many being drafted, but the Army Branch of the Enlisted Reserve Corps is calling up its men rapidly.

Fraternity memberships are dropping. Many houses are finding themselves with such reduced memberships that several have closed their dining rooms and are taking meals at other houses. For instance, Delta Phi is eating lunch and dinner with Delta Upsilon. The Dekes are shaving the board of the Psi U house. The Zeta Psi membership has moved into the Chi Phi house following the breakdown of the Zete heating system.

don't know for sure just what type of military training will be carried on at Cornell. From all of the various reports and rumors we can tell you what is most likely to happen. The men in the Enlisted Reserve Corps are being called up, will be given several months of basic training at a camp, and those showing sufficient aptitude for specialization will be sent to a college campus for specialized training.

We think Cornell will specialize in some form of engineering. How many men will be sent here remains to be seen, but reports are that the number may reach 2,500. These will be men from many colleges not just Cornell. As for accommodations for such a group the University has recommended to the War Department the use of fraternity houses, agreeing to store and insure the furniture, to redecorate the house following the war, and to reimburse each fraternity for the use of the house.

While the Army and Navy prefer the use of dormitories, it happens that the Cornell Naval Training Station has already taken over all of the Baker dormitories, as well as Sage College. As for the problem of mess, the University suggests the use of Willard Straight Hall, probably enclosing the terrace section, and using the main cafeterias.

This matter of turning the campus into a training camp has been hanging fire for many months, and everyone concerned on the Hill is anxious to know the final answer. In the meantime, the University is waiting for word to proceed in getting ready for such a group, but when the word will come, and when the men will arrive are two unknown quantities at the moment.

Chapter Faces Losses In Membership; May Share Eating Facilities

Arrangement Being Worked Out for Another House To Eat with Us

In the fall we started with a chapter of 28 men, 24 of whom lived in the house. We pledged 15 freshmen, eight moving into the house when they were forced to leave the dormitories when the Navy moved in.

Since that time we have lost 15 members, 13 to the armed forces and two by graduation. Two pledges have just been added, and at this time there are 30 in the chapter, 20 living in the house and approximately 22 eating regularly in the dining room.

The most immediate and critical problem we face is that of trying to keep the dining room operating. Steady rise in food cost coupled with the steady exodus of brothers makes it difficult. If the number in the dining room drops below 20 we may be forced to close it. Solution to the problem seems to be the merging of two fraternities into a common dining room. Negotiations between us and another house are presently under way, and it is entirely possible that within a few weeks 15 or more boys from that house may be eating in our dining room.


Whether the house itself shuts down entirely depends largely upon the calling up of the Enlisted Reserve Corps. While the Navy has stated it will not call its reserves until June, the Army's plans are not known. But five of our members are in the Navy while 21 are in the Army Reserves. If the latter is called we would be forced to close immediately.

I do not think the ERC will be called before the term's end, and that we may finish out the school year. However, I do feel that June will bring the complete end of the chapter for the duration. The house will probably be leased to the Army as a dormitory for men sent here for technical training.
