# G. P. McNear '13 Killed in Climax Of Labor Dispute

The chapter was saddened recently at the sudden announcement of the tragic death of George Plummer Mc-Near '13, who was killed March 10, 1947, at Peoria, Illinois by a burst of gunfire from a speeding automobile. It is believed that his death is a result of his activities as president of the strike-bound and strife-torn Toledo, Peoria & Western Railroad.

George was a resident of Petaluma, California when he entered Cornell in 1909 as a transfer from the U. of California. As a member of Alpha Delta Phi, he also belonged to Tau Beta Pi and Quill and Dagger. He rowed on the Junior varsity squad as a sophomore and was on the varsity four-oared crew in his Junior year.

The 55-year-old executive, who since 1941 had defied 13 striking brotherhoods in one of the nation's longest and bloodiest labor disputes, was shot from ambush in gang style near his residence in a fashionable Peoria district. He died a half hour later.

## Strikers Out 17 Months

The 239-mile feeder railroad across Illinois from Effner, Indiana to Keokuk, Iowa, has been crippled continuously for the past 17 months by a strike. The company-union dispute has been marked by litigation, shootings, fires, and obstruction of trains. Two pickets were killed and three wounded at Gridley, Ill., February, 1946. Four railroad guards were later acquitted of manslaughter in that shooting.

George worked up from railroad construction work into Wall Street investment circles and purchased the railroad at a receiver's auction in 1926. He improved the line steadily and turned red ink into black.

#### Wage and Rule Dispute

The current dispute began December 2, 1941, when 104 engineers and trainmen among 600 employees quit work in protest against a new wage scale and new working rules. During government wartime management after March, 1942, operation was normal, but negotiations failed and the strike was renewed October 1, 1945, when the road was returned to his management. George is survived by his wife and four children.

Alva Bradley '07, 706 Marion Bldg., Cleveland, Ohio has been announced as chairman of the newly

created American Foundation of High-Blood Pressure which will finance medical research in colleges and health centers.

Brother Bradley explains that despite the fact that heart ailments kill many more persons than cancer and ten times more than tuberculosis, no nation-wide organization existed to sponsor research such as the new foundation proposes. Funds will be raised on a nation-wide scale to finance the study of high-blood pressure and arteriosclerosis. Money for a three-year program has already been raised, Mr. Bradley, former owner of the Cleveland baseball club, states.
