Alumni Corporation Holds Annual Meeting, Elects Tone President

The Alumni Corporation of the Cornell Chapter of Alpha Delta Phi held its annual meeting at the chapter house on March 20. The meeting was called to order by President F. Jerome Tone, Jr., '24, and the work of the chapter during the past year was discussed along with plans for the coming year.

After the routine business of reading and approving the minutes of the last meeting, the treasurer's report was read and this year's operating cost and surplus were discussed. It was reported that the operating surplus for this year would be smaller due to the rising costs of living, expenditures of about \$2,-000.00, and a smaller number of men initiated. With this in mind, the size of the active chapter was then discussed at some length; the consensus was that classes should be initiated of such size as to assure a continuing membership of about 50 members.

Work of the House and Grounds since the last meeting was discussed. Subjects included were the hot water system in the house, and the need for a new water tank; landscaping of the grounds between Alpha Delt and Phi Gamma Delta, and lastly the plans for repair of the Lodge.

It was unanimously voted that the active chapter proceed with a campaign to raise money specifically for the renovation of the Lodge. It was then voted to rescind the motion on the non-use of the Lodge, and permit its use in the future in view of the work done by the active chapter, which has removed the danger of falling plaster.

John M. Young '26 has been rechosen representative of the active chapter to the Executive Council. Brother Young served in this capacity for the last two years.


