He is conscientious, able, thorough. He has a sense of humor and regard for the opinions of his fellows. He has the ability to dig; to search for the new approach. He is a modern executive in the best sense of the term; his new approach to the problems of an old industry typify the creative qualities that a man of his energy and practical thought can bring to Cornell's present day problems as a representative on the Board of Trustees of the vast younger group of alumni."

Charles H. Divine '11, Author, Poet: Dies

Charles H. Divine '11, well known author and poet, died on May 8th this year in Bay Pines, Fla. His literary works include the novel, Cograc Hill, based on his experiences in World War I, three volumes of poetry, more than 100 short stories, and several plays. He was a senior instructor in English at Triple Cities College in Endicott before he moved to Florida in 1948 because of ill health. From 1912 to 1917 he was a reporter on the New York Sun.

The New York Central Railroad cars featured menu covers using the theme of Cornell University recently.


A handsome etching of the Clock Tower decorates the front, while the back cover contains photographs of Myron Taylor and Olin Hall.


Your Alpha Delt Through The Years
