Alpha Delt Acts To Continue Its Leadership Role At Cornell

A s most of you know, and with many thanks to brother John S. Dyson '65, Cornell has publicly declared its support of the Greek system and recognized our contribution to the educational mission of the university. Brother Dyson's hand was also evident in the expansion and institutionalization of the office of fraternity and sorority affairs. Finally, there has been a reinvigoration of the Alumni Interfraternity Council and a challenge to all Greek alumni to become more active and involved in their respective houses in order to give back to a system that has helped shape us all.

Alpha Delt has had a strong, active, and involved alumni association for some time, and we have been at the leading edge of much of what has happened to date. As a result, we have constantly been evaluating our position as well as our ability to maintain our strength within a system that is growing around us.

The condition of fraternity housing has nationally been identified as a key factor in sustaining the viability of any one specific chapter and the system as a whole. Studies here at Cornell have indicated that many houses will require a major investment to renovate, upgrade, and modernize them to include the same safety, comfort, and technological advances now available in most dormitories. In fact, during the past decade, many of the strongest fraternities have invested millions of dollars toward such upgrades and improvements.

Over the past few years, we have made many improvements to the house, but mostly they have been for safety, code compliance, and basic operating systems. Relatively few dollars have been spent on improving the house's appearance and structure and none on technological upgrades.

Recognizing the direct relationship between a facility's quality and the strength of the fraternity's membership, an expanding group of alumni has been analyzing Alpha Delt's current situation and how it compares to those of other fraternities that vie for leadership in the Greek system. As an aside, yet no less important, we are also reviewing our alumni corporation structure, developing job descriptions, and creating a corporate objective and mission statement along with transition plans for the smooth changing of our leadership on a more routine basis.

Back to the building... We have initiated an engineering study to determine the short- and long-term needs of the chapter and the investment required for us to maintain our leading position into the foreseeable future. The undergraduates have been involved and will continue recommending upgrades that they feel are important. We are also consulting with the administration and academic community to focus on technological and facility needs. Alumni involvement is being sought at all levels, but specifically regarding renovations that you believe will make the house more attractive and useful to our membership.

We will have the engineering report by summer's end and will share the details with you. As always, your input, comments, and involvement are more than welcome—they are requested. An Update On The Facility And Its Needs

any of you may not have been back to Cornell and the Alpha Delt house in the last year or so. Let me bring you up-to-date on the facility.

This may sound mundane, but the house continues to pass all inspections—fire, safety, and sanitation. Last summer there was a major remodeling of the first-floor (alumni suite or flat, depending on your time at Cornell) bathrooms. The tub has been replaced by a shower. Some of us wish this had been done years ago! The

smaller bathroom now has a toilet, and both rooms are handsomely tiled.

For safety reasons the library doors to the porch have been replaced and have interior press-bar fixtures for easy egress. Also, the front door now opens out. You don't need to worry about chimney bricks falling on you or your car. The chimneys have been tuck-pointed. During the winter break the floors were sanded and sealed with four coats of polyurethane, and the hot water (continued on page four)

Capital improvements to be made include placing lexan covering on the outside of all ground-floor windows to prevent theft and to deter vandalism. Old furniture in the house may also be replaced. Work on the ACEF-sponsored computer-study lounge is also in full swing, with the project to be completed this summer.

The most crucial project on the horizon is the formation of a comprehensive plan to detail the repairs needed by the chapter house and lodge, including the interior systems such as plumbing and electric. Currently a structural engineering firm is coordinating the effort and will present a detailed report at the spring board meeting.

As my time at Alpha Delt draws to a close, I feel confident that the house is ready for the future. The young leadership has shown an earnest interest in the larger issues facing both our house and the fraternity system at Cornell in general. News From The Adelphic Cornell Educational Fund: Awards And The Computer Room Project



Since these awards have been so well received, the ACEF trustees voted on initiation weekend to expand and enhance the program. Historically each spring semester, in addition to the excellence awards, the ACEF has awarded the Lewis, Bruce Hart, and Ted Booth awards. Since these memorial awards have always been very modest in amount, their importance has been somewhat lost. To remedy this situation, the ACEF trustees voted to roll them into the excellence award program, thereby increasing their amount and significance. We look forward to announcing those winners in the next newsletter.

Our on-campus program continues to include modest funding for the *Cornell Political Forum*, the Knight writing program (with its James Rice '30

Award), and the engineering communications program (with its Thomas Foulkes '52 Award). These efforts, we believe, are promoting good writing and pro-fraternity public relations.

What's the status of the computer room, you ask? Albeit slower than most would like, the "study lounge and computing center" (SLCC) is progressing. During the winter break, while the chapter's new hot water boiler was being installed, the old washing machines and dryers were removed from the space where the SLCC is going to be located. While this doesn't sound like much, the removal also included rerouting, cutting, and capping a number of old supply pipes and drains—as well as building (i.e. all new piping and equipment) a new laundry room in the former "supply closet" behind the kitchen. Some prep work remains (to be completed, we hope, by the beginning of summer), so our next step will be to develop a detailed set of construction drawings so that the project can go out for bid. Again, we thank alumni George Kennedy '52, Randy Bus '68, and Joe Kujawa '91 for their help with this project—as well as John Dyson for the "seed money" to start this major effort.


Mike's contributions to Karen Modeling included helping the company fix computer pro-

"This job was very different for me,"




